

The wine it grew in 2017 almost smells wellbuilt, with a concentrated cherry scent that seems to emerge from stone. The wine's mineral tension gives it an assertive power and energy, its pure fruit framed by a firm grip of tannins with umami savor. It's mouthwatering now, and built to age. 

90 Hyland Estates \$60 2017 McMinnville Wadenswil Pinot Noir From old Wadenswil-clone vines, this shows a kind of burly concentration in its dark cherry and red plum flavors. 93 RR Wines 2012 Ribbon Ridge Ridgecrest Vineyards Pinot Noir Harry Peterson-Nedry sought to validate the aging power of Oregon pinot noir by submitting a handful of older vintages for review with the current vintage. This 2012 proves his point, the wine bringing together dark fruit and haunting secondary aromas. It's sumptuous from the first sip, in its savory scents of black tea, clove and smoke and its dark, burnished fruit. After the mint and clove notes recede, the wine lasts with a sophisticated, layered, complex array of dried-fruit flavors, from plum to black cherry and strawberry. Drink now to remind yourself of the wonders of older Oregon pinot. (433 cases) - P.J.C.

92 RR Wines 2007 Ribbon Ridge Ridgecrest Vineyards Pinot Noir At 12 years of age, this Ribbon Ridge wine still has plenty of life, with the savor of consommé and a caramelized sweetness.
